Although this pastel was once considered to be the work of James Sharples (c. 1751-1811), this attribution was changed when research revealed that Sharples was in England during 1804 when the image was drawn. Later it was thought to be the work of William Doyle (1769-1828) because of an 1805 receipt among the Thomas papers documenting the fact that Doyle was paid for the completion of several miniatures. In 1990, similarities were noted between this image and the pastel of Isaiah Thomas attributed to Gerrit Schipper (cat. #124). This observation has led to the possibility that this profile was also drawn by that artist or copied after Schipper's work.

This pastel was part of a group of five images of members of the Thomas family. A second portrait of Thomas's wife Mary Thomas Fowle Thomas, which served as a pendant for this image and was inscribed by Isaiah Thomas "Mary Thomas, wife of Isaiah Thomas, Esq. of Worcester. Taken 1804," was owned by the Boston dealer Maurice Rubin of Columbia House Antiques in 1951.⁴ Portraits of Thomas's son Isaiah Thomas, Jr. and his wife Mary Weld Thomas (cat. #132), and a profile of her sister, Hannah Weld (cat. #143) completed the group.
