On Friday Sept 30th 1768, the ships of war, which I have not Transcrib'd, so came up the Harbour and Anchored round the Town; their Cannons lighted a Long Wharf as a Sign on their Cables, as for a regular Regt. At noon on Saturday October the 7th the first Regt. of Foot, with a detachment from the 60th Regt. of Foot, landed on the Long Wharf: they formed and March'd with their Colours, Drums beating, & playing, and Colours flying, up Kings Street. Each Soldier having about 16 rounds of Powder and Ball.

In the Front of the Harbour the Mouth of the River for America. This View is the only well known of the Harbour formed for the purpose of Landing Troops of the King's Army. It is a very large and commodious Wharf.
